

Jim Whitesel Memorial Scholarship



About the Scholarship: This scholarship is to be awarded to a qualified athletic training student, with preference to students in NATA's District 10.

About Jim Whitesel: Jim ("Jimmy") Whitesel attended the University of Washington (1966-1971) where he was the school's first ever student athletic trainer. After graduating in 1971 with a MS Degree, he was hired as an assistant Athletic Trainer at Washington State

University from 1971-1973. He took his expertise and intense passion for his profession to Seattle Pacific University where he was the head trainer from 1974-1976.

In 1976, Jim accepted a position as an Assistant Athletic Trainer for the Seattle Seahawks. He loved being a part of the Seahawks' inaugural season, and the early years of a growing professional football team in Seattle.

In 1983, Jim became the Head Athletic Trainer for the Seattle Seahawks, serving until 1998. In 1988, his NFL peers recognized the professionalism and quality of care given to the Seahawks and named him and his staff as the "NFL Training Staff of the Year."

He worked tirelessly in both public relations and government affairs at the state, district and national levels. He served with distinction across all levels within the National Athletic Trainers' Association

(NATA). As president of the Washington State Athletic Trainers' Association, Jim set the stage with legislators and a growing membership to work toward Washington's state licensure. He rallied the Washington athletic trainers to see the value of licensure. As a prolific advocate, he lobbied non-stop with legislators in Olympia. He served as NWATA-District 10 Secretary/Treasurer (1988-1994) and then as Director/President (1994-1998). Jim was proud to be an Athletic Trainer, and equally proud of WSATA, NWATA and the NATA. For his efforts and contributions, he was recognized with the NATA Most Distinguished Athletic Trainer award and reached the pinnacle of recognition for the WSATA, the NWATA and the NATA by being inducted into these prestigious Hall of Fames. When asked about his NATA Hall of Fame ring, he always stated it was "more important than winning the Super Bowl because I was voted by my peers."

Jim also owned two sports therapy clinics in the greater Seattle area. He took care of hundreds upon hundreds of the young and old, including high school, professional and weekend athletes. He donated time and financial resources to Lake Washington High School athletic and educational programs, as education was paramount to his vision for a well-rounded student athlete.

Jim passed away on August 9, 2018.
